

Named for the patroness saint of the environment, paperless recurring monthly giving is the greenest way to contribute, saving valuable resources and reducing




#### THE LUMEN CHRISTI LEGACY SOCIETY

#### Feeding those in need for the glory of God

When it comes to food insecurity, some of the most vulnerable are our senior citizens living on a fixed income or below the poverty line. The SeniorDine program feeds those in need in three ways: Home Delivery, Community Dining in senior centers and churches, and select restaurants in Kankakee, which offer a special menu for its recipients.

Brandon Barrows, Nutrition Program Director, is passionate about this ministry and proud that it nourishes both the body and social soul. "Many of these folks lack social connection and meeting their physical needs along with their social needs is deeply fulfilling," he said. Seeing a smiling face at your door with a hot meal in hand or sharing a healthy meal and good conversation with fellow seniors helps them feel cared for on many levels.

There are over 190 clients enrolled in the program with more than 110 people on the waitlist and the number keeps growing. "The more people we can help stay independent within our community, the better," said Brandon. Together we can make that happen — one plate, and one kind gesture at a time.

## Educating our Catholic school leaders for the glory of God

A Catholic education is a triple blessing. The academic excellence it provides, coupled with the values it instills and life-long friendships it helps create, sets a strong foundation for lives lived deeply in faith. The Diocese of Joliet Catholic Schools Office is a ministry whose mission is to provide instruction and support for our principals, teachers, and staff to help them better educate and guide young minds and hearts daily.



Professional development initiatives, classes, and workshops are both academically driven and spiritually rooted. Becky Ward is the principal of St. Raphael Catholic School in Naperville. "Honestly, I am overwhelmed by the incredible support the Catholic Schools Office provides," she said.

Becky has seen firsthand how her teachers apply their leanings to the classroom, the joy it brings, and the difference it makes in their students. "Our Catholic faith is the cornerstone of everything we do," she said. "It's taught in every subject and most especially in the way our teachers and students treat each other and show each other Christ's love."

# Enriching religious education for the glory of God

God calls us to serve in many special ways. This includes those who answer His call to teach the Catholic faith to our children and adults in formation throughout our diocese.

Deacon Anthony Clishem, Catechetical Formation Leader for the Catechesis and Evangelization Ministry for the Diocese of Joliet,



said it best, "Jesus was a teacher and the catechists themselves have a beautiful vocation as teachers who use their gifts to help their students become more like the children of God they are meant to be."

The Catechetical Institute is a valuable resource for training our faith formation leaders, like Lauren Nelson and Kim Kroeze. They lead the religious education program at Holy Spirit Catholic Church in Naperville.

Lauren believes teaching the faith is more than sacramental preparation. "It's preparing our children to be Catholics in the world," she said. Kim feels the training she receives is "spiritual nourishment" that feeds her and in turn, nourishes her students. "The more we grow in faith as catechists, the more we can help them grow their own seeds of faith."
